On Calling a Pastor - the Presbyterian and Spiritual Way

This is what God says, the God who builds a road right through the ocean, who carves a path through pounding waves,

The God who summons horses and chariots
and armies—they lie down and then can't get up;

"Forget about what's happened; don't keep going over old history.
Be alert, be present. I'm about to do something brand-new.

As we continue our journey to find new pastoral leadership for Trinity Presbyterian, the next few months will be exciting, tedious, joyful, spiritually fulfilling, frustrating, inspiring, and focused. The process is one of discernment and will challenge you as a congregation to listen closely for God's voice and direction on your mission and ministry during this new stage of the congregation's life.

It is my prayer you all will come together around the common goal of identifying who God is calling to serve your congregation as your next pastor. And this takes time and a "decently and in order" process.

Our *Book of Order* instructs us that "Christ calls the Church into being, giving it all that is necessary for its mission in the world, for its sanctification, and for its service to God. Christ is present with the Church in both Spirit and Word. Christ alone rules, calls, teaches, and uses the Church as he wills." (Book of Order, F-1.0202).

As Presbyterians we believe that God uses committees, procedures, and our polity, all built on the foundation of a deep measure of prayer, Scripture,

and worship, to help us discern who it is that God is calling to be your pastor. This call is confirmed as

the pastor, the church, and the presbytery each say "yes" to the relationship. This three-way partnership is acted out throughout the pastoral call process, with the presbytery having the primary responsibility for oversight of the process. "

So, my call as a transitional pastor is not only to provide pastoral leadership for worship and pastoral care as needed but to coordinate this threefold partnership only with guiding your dis-

cernment process. So, over the coming months I'll take time to reflect (what was), correct (change what isn't working), protect (maintain what is working), resurrect (revitalize the ministry) and envision (discover a new church identity).

Some of the most important work during this time will be assisting you all with the Congregational Mission Study. Understanding the nature of Trinity Presbyterian Church and your unique mission is essential before the search for a new pastor can begin. A mission study is basically asking three simple but profound questions: WHO ARE WE? WHO IS GOD CALLING US TO BE? WHERE IS GOD CALLING US TO GO? Having a good understanding of those questions will help you decide the type of leadership you will need in your new pastor as well as communicate your ministry narrative to prospective pastors discerning a call to Trinity.

And to help with this activity, your Session will soon appoint a Mission Study Committee to begin this process. It is my hope that the Mission Study Committee will join me in developing a discernment process that we will use during our 40 days of Lent. 40 days of faithful listening to gather your thoughts, feelings, insights, and discernment in who you are and who God is calling Trinity to be. Then *afterwards* we will come together as a church family for a "Gleaning Session" that I hope will be a big part of the Mission Study Report and to begin to understand and what type of pastor can lead us to answer this emerging call from God.

Then during the month of May, the Mission Study Committee will try to complete the Mission Study Report and have Trinity's Session give their insights and approval. It is at this point Session will send this report to Missouri Union Presbytery's Commission on Ministry for their approval. If all goes well, and as planned, it is then Trinity will be able to nominate a Pastor Nominating Committee who can begin the process of being trained by the General Presbyter and COM liaison and writing the MDP (Ministry Discernment Profile). The MDP is basically a search tool that tries to match up the churches hopes, dreams, and call with a pastor's hopes, dreams, and call.

Like I said at the beginning, this call process will be exciting, tedious, joyful, spiritually fulfilling, frustrating, inspiring, and focused. It's a time to open ourselves to the work of the Spirit who will guide, nudge, inspire, and inform us in our journey toward finding Trinity's new emerging pastoral leadership. I hope you will join me in listening to God and responding to his invitation to be part of this holy season of discernment.

summer, July 28-31.


Triennium is an ecumenical event hosted by the Presbyterian Church

Faith Beyond Borders: Doing Justice In A Dangerous World by Don Mosley with Joyce Hollyday

The establishment of Jubilee Partners to work with refugees *evolved from Koinonia* Farm and Habitat For Humanity. "Those who live and work at Jubilee are attuned to the realities of Jubilee and about how much God has blessed them." Families who first came to Jubilee were often scarred by war and extreme hunger, by torture camps and prisons from sixteen countries in 2009. They began worshiping, playing games, chatting with one another, eating together at the Jubilee community in NE Georgia.

Some people arriving at Jubilee would express bewilderment at their experiences. Not understanding the fact of being friends with neighbors without any regard for ethnic backgrounds. Then 'ethnic cleansing' breaking out among them. Many stories from immigrants about their lives are included. The book celebrates what has been and anticipates what is yet to come. It is about walking by faith and putting faith into action.

Highlights from the January Session Meeting

The first meeting of the new year began joyfully as session welcomed new members Brad and Debbie Calder (see writeup on page 2 of this newsletter).

Other items:

- ♦ Heard thoughts from Rev. Osborn about creating a more formalized process for engaging visitors and preparing them for membership;
- ◆ Reviewed thank you notes from Bread for the World, Agape House, Voluntary Action Center, and the Food Bank for recent donations and from the Shape Note Singers for allowing them to meet at Trinity. A note was also received from Office Assistant Debbie Newkirk thanking Session for her Christmas bonus.
- ♦ Were informed that Rev. Kathie Jackson will preach at Trinity on Sunday, February 16.

- ♦ Were informed that the 2025 Session retreat is tentatively scheduled for Saturday, November 22.
- ◆ Approved Elder Debbie Newkirk to serve as Trinity's elder-commissioner to the February 22 presbytery meeting in Jefferson City.
- ◆ Approved the following officers of the corporation for 2025: President: Susan Winkelmann, Clerk; Vice-President: Elinor Arendt; Chair of Property; Secretary/Treasurer: Karen Neely, Chair of Stewardship and Finance. (Trinity's Manual of Operations specifies that officers are designated by position held.)
- ♦ Heard a report from Stewardship and Finance Chair Karen Neely that a \$5,000 donation to establish a new, general purpose endowment fund has been received.

Memorial Garden Upgrades Update

Last August, the Property Committee announced plans to upgrade the Memorial Garden area with a paved surface, retaining wall, new drainage system and new landscaping. Work on the Garden was scheduled to begin in late fall, but this was delayed by the landscaping company when many of their seasonal workers left for the winter. The work is now scheduled for early spring.

The total cost of these improvements will be approximately \$24,000. Session approved the use of \$7,700 in memorial funds for the project, and an additional \$3,000 was already in a designated fund for the Garden. Session also approved asking the congregation for donations toward the balance of the cost. To date, we have received \$7,825 in donations, leaving \$5,475.00 needed to fully fund the project.
