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Dear Friends,

The season of Advent and Christmas is a rich, meaningful, and mysterious time for many of us who take time to faithfully wait upon the Lord's coming at Bethlehem. It's the beginning of the liturgical year, a new year to begin the journey from the stable, to the cross, and to an ongoing resurrected faith. And it all begins with God enfleshed, born in a manger. This new season of faith is always a good time for reflection, examination, and recommitment.

As I reflected on this season and my new call to be your transitional pastor, my heart was drawn to a couple of my advent devotions from "Celts to the Creche: Celtic Advent Devotional." Brenda Warren writes about St. Frideswide, Abbess of Oxford, who is known for miraculous healings. One story about her was a critical time when she was led to safety by a mysterious white-robed stranger (an angel?) to a place of refuge, where a holy well appeared near a pigsty that she eventually converted into a chapel.

In her advent devotion, Brenda Warren writes these soul awakening words:

It is captivation to consider how the Spirit of our living and loving God can turn the pigsties in our life into chapels with wells of living water as was done for St. Frideswide. It reminds us of how a dirty, smelly noisy stable in Bethlehem became a crèche for the birth of the King of the world. The Spirit is in the business of transforming the ugly, stinky, dirty places of our life into sweet soul sanctuaries for Christ to be born anew in our lives.

Then for the December 18th advent devotional Warren introduces us to Benedict Biscop who brought education, libraries, beauty, and faith to the people of Northumbria. Biscop is known for his many pilgrimages to Rome where he often found his plans change, detouring to different cities, and accepting new unexpected responsibilities. In Warren's meditation for Advent on Benedict Biscop's life of faith she writes:

The Spirit often works in surprising ways!... We are going in one direction in life and a door is closed or we find ourselves on an unexplained new path in life. Then as we look back at these unplanned and often unwanted detours in our life, we often can see God's hand in these paths and we simply say, "thank you." Or as my wife, Margaret, loves to remind me and others when life takes a detour: remember God's promises, "for I have plans to help you and not to harm you, to give you a hope and a future." (Jeremiah 29:11)

Friends, during this transition, as we begin a new year together, remember that changed plans, closed doors, painful heartbreaks often lead us to new places beyond what we can ever dream of or imagine. And may Christ's Spirit come and remake our lives and Trinity Presbyterian Church into sweet sanctuaries for Christ to live and work.

An Organist's Confession: Behind the Console

Church music is often perceived as a realm of solemnity and spiritual reflection, but let me tell you, the life of an organist behind the pipes can be as entertaining as a comedy show—and I have the best seat in the house.

Picture this: it's Sunday morning, the congregation is gathered, and I'm perched on my organ bench, fingers poised over the keys. The sanctuary is a calm sea of heads, all facing forward, oblivious to the chaos hidden behind the majestic organ console. I like to think of myself as the Wizard of Oz, only with more pedals and fewer flying monkeys.

Let's start with the pedals. Oh, the pedals! For the uninitiated, the organ is played not just with hands but with feet too. Imagine trying to perform a graceful ballet while simultaneously typing an essay, and you'll have a rough idea of the coordination required. Inevitably, there's always a slip-up—a foot missing its mark and hitting the wrong note. The congregation might think it's a new avant-garde chord, but in reality, it's just my feet rebelling against the tyranny of a morning service. I sometimes cheat and use the Bass coupler because of the neuropathy in my big size 13 feet.

Then there's the music. You'd think by now, I'd have the entire hymnal memorized, but alas, my memory is as reliable as a screen door on a submarine. Hence, the hymnal, which has a pesky habit of falling off the stand at the most inopportune moments. It becomes a high-stakes game of Jenga, with each page turned bringing the precarious pile closer to collapse. One dramatic crescendo and the entire stack can topple, leaving me scrambling like a cat in a thunderstorm to get everything back in place.

Speaking of drama, there's nothing quite like the church organ to amplify emotional moments. A well-timed chord can elevate a hymn to angelic heights or add a thunderous exclamation point to a fire-and-brimstone sermon. But with great power comes great responsibility, and sometimes, the power goes straight to my head. There's a secret joy in inserting an unexpected trill or an ominous minor key transition, watching the congregation squirm just a little, wondering if it's a divine message or just a musical misstep.

Of course, the organist's life isn't just filled with mishaps and mischief. There's the sheer delight of playing a piece that sends chills down your spine, knowing you're the invisible force guiding the congregation's emotional journey. It's a strange form of invisibility cloak—everyone hears you, but no one really sees you, hidden behind the pipes, like a musical phantom.

And then there's the camaraderie with the choir. If you've never heard a tenor's high note falter because he caught sight of the organist's exaggerated eye roll, you're missing out. The silent communication, the shared glances and suppressed giggles, are the unsung harmonies that make church music a truly communal experience.

So next time you find yourself in church, listening to the organ's majestic sounds, spare a thought for the person behind the music—the one battling rebellious feet, rogue sheet music, and the occasional fit of mischief. We might be hidden from view, but we're very much part of the divine comedy unfolding within these sacred walls.

Overcomer: 8 Ways to Live a Life of Unstoppable Strength, Unmovable Faith, and Unbelievable Power by David Jeremiah

Dr. Jeremiah believes that there are at least 8 different ways we will be challenged and we must be prepared with strategies for overcoming the issues we face. Chapters addressing challenges are overcoming weakness with strength, overcoming falsehood with truth, overcoming evil with good, overcoming anxiety with peace, overcoming fear with faith, overcoming confusion with wisdom, overcoming temptation with scripture, overcoming everything with prayer. Overcomers concentrate on details that go unnoticed by others. They do what needs to be done, even when no one is watching.

Dr. Jeremiah shares scripture examples as well as stories from everyday living which help guide us to prepare to be an overcomer.
